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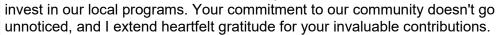
BOARD CHAIR MESSAGE

Angel Jimenez, Owner of T & A Armory has been in Ridgecrest since he was stationed here in 2008. When he retired he decided to stay here and put his military training to good use for local citizens. In January, Jimenez had a soft opening of his storefront on North Downs with a grand opening to be held in February.



His intention is to educate. He wants to impart "knowledge that firearms are not bad. It's the people that give it a bad name, just like with anything." He wants to educate, "not to push it on them. Because not everybody is into firearms. I wasn't into firearms growing up. I saw them as taboo as well. It was only once I joined the military and got the proper training, the proper education for me to take a liking to it and then going out with coworkers and learning the fundamentals of safety aspects." He sees firearms as tools in a toolbox.

To that end he pursued his business plan. He describes the business as, "a firearm shop that caters to selling firearms, repairing firearms, manufacturing parts with the guidelines of California Rules and Regulations. Selling ammo, selling apparel, gear, clothing, T shirts, hoodies, and self defense clothing.

"We're starting to sell and cater to self defense for women. Because not everybody is into firearms. So this is a safer, easier way to get into self defense and protection. We offer stun guns, pepper spray, self defense keychains that have an array of different self defense tools."

Jimenez is becoming certified to become a Conceal Carry Weapon (CCW) instructor. Once certified he will begin offering classes. Classes will be offered as a combination of classroom setting and fire range. After a participant passes the classroom setting test they move on to the range. "You have to show that you can hit the target. There are certain intervals that you have to move backwards shooting; you have to score certain amount to pass and then you get a certificate which is good for two years."

Jimenez tells us, "I've been welcomed with open arms in just a short period of time, from other gun shops. I am the new guy in the block offering some of the same traits that some gun shops offer but some don't.

"I joined the Chamber of Commerce to help further my knowledge, what's out there, I'm just learning this side of the business and I wanted to be able to learn what is out there to help me succeed in our town." He continues, "getting to meet and mingle and become a better ambassador of my business to other businesses, and then likewise, learning their trade or what they're offering and see how I can learn to operate in the same mindset."

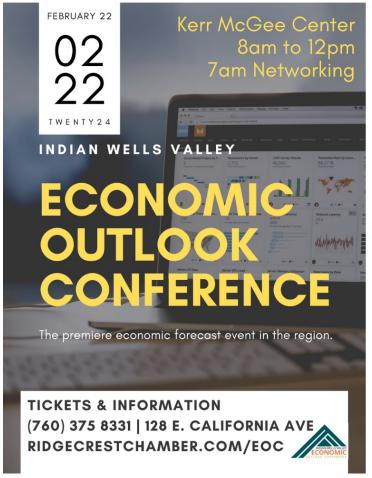

LABOR LAW CORNER

Labor Commissioner FAQ Ties Paid Sick Time Off to Work Day Length

I understand that the state is now requiring employers to provide more time off for paid sick leave than it did in previous years. My employees work an alternative workweek consisting of four 10hour shifts per week. How many hours of paid sick leave must I allow my employees to use each year?



You are correct that beginning January 1, 2024, California state law requires additional time off for paid sick leave. Last year, the California Legislature passed SB 616. That bill amended the Healthy Workplaces, Healthy Families Act of 2014 by increasing the time off for paid sick leave from 24 hours or 3 days, to 40 hours or 5 days.

The amount of time off required can be found in California Labor Code Section 246, which contains the language requiring employers to provide "40 hours or 5 days" of paid time off.

The California Labor Commissioner (which oversees the paid sick leave law in California) has made it clear that this phrase means that the employee is entitled to the greater of either the 40 hours or 5 days of time off. In its Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) from December 21, 2023, the Labor Commissioner's office addressed your specific question.

In FAQ number 2, the Labor Commissioner states that if an employee works 10-hour days, under the new law, the employee would be entitled to use 50 hours of paid sick leave per year.

However, if an employee works only 6 hours per day, that employee still would be entitled to use 40 hours of paid sick leave per year.
